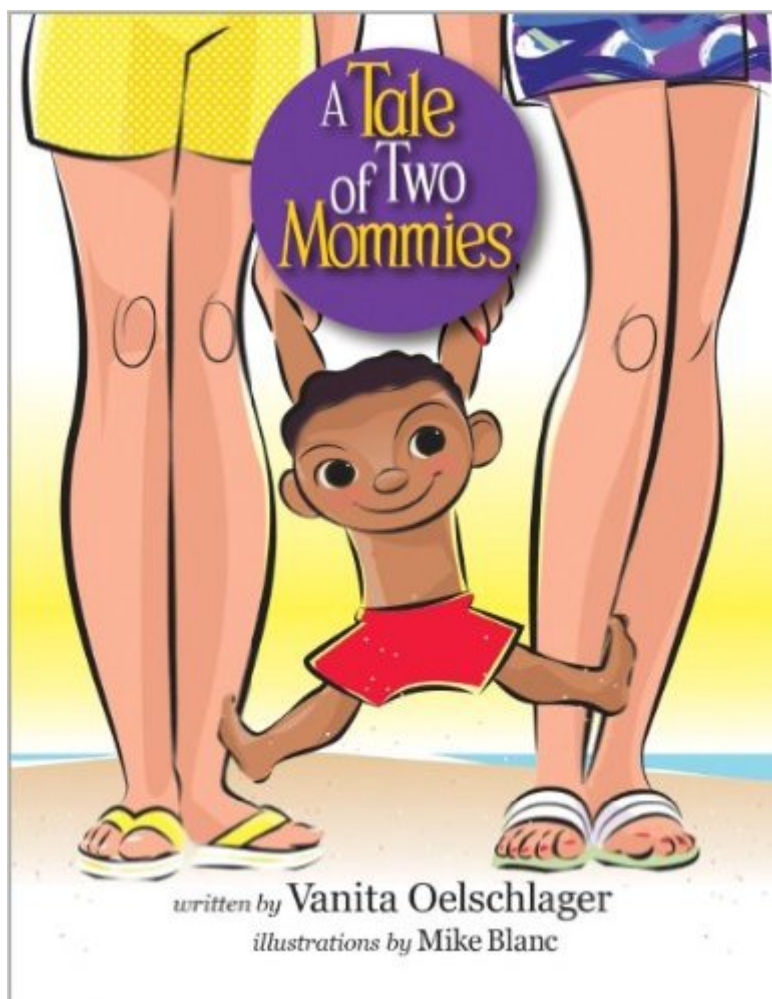


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# A Tale Of Two Mommies



## Synopsis

I bought this book for my friends who are having a baby and figured if I decided it was not an appropriate baby book I would give it to my son (he's 5). However, when I got the book and was actually able to read it I was so disappointed. It asks all sorts of cliché questions and there is a consistent stereotype that mama does masculine things and mommy feminine (I could have them mixed up, but you get the point). I could swear this book is written by a straight person trying to write a book for gay people. Beyond all of this, the text was abrupt, it is definitely not a story but rather just a series of questions and answers, which I had noted other reviewers mentioned, I just didn't expect the abruptness of it all. The pictures aren't bad, but nothing spectacular, but if the story had been

better they would have been more than adequate. If you are desperate for a book with two moms then I guess this might be worth getting. Otherwise I'd pass. I've found several stories that talk about families in broader terms and not specifically heterosexual families that I much prefer and will stick with for now.

The reality is that our world is constantly changing and with more and more same sex couples raising children of their own, it's important for all children to be taught that different is ok but that "different" is not that different at all. These books do just that. In each of the books we have a little girl being raised by daddies and a little boy being raised by mommies. Each has curious friends who are asking which parent does what in their household. I personally enjoyed reading *A Tale of Two Daddies* more than *A Tale of Two Mommies*. I found the rhyming and the flow to be executed a bit better with the daddies and the illustrations were great for both books. Overall, I think these books serve their purpose, although, I do think that it would be best for smaller children. I think older kids would pose tougher questions but for smaller kids, these books are the right fit. Copies of each book were provided by Vanita Books via NetGalley.

Cute and I liked the concept, but it was a little confusing to my 7 year old nephew and 5 1/2 year old daughter. They were getting confused about which mom the book was talking about on each page. I bought the book to start a conversation with my nephew. My daughter has a few friends with two moms, so this is perfectly normal to her, but my nephew has been having a hard time understanding how/why anyone would have two moms or two dads. This book and a few other books helped start a conversation with him about it.

This book (*A Tale of Two Mommies*) is for a younger child than I anticipated so I am not sure how to rate it. I can say that it presents the idea of having two mommies in terms a child, even a fairly young child, could understand: who takes care of you when you're sick? Who plays ball with you? Who bakes cookies? etc. Of course my favorites are when the little boy says that they both do!. There's no propagandizing, just simple answers to a questions important to a child. Probably a very good book to help a young child understand that families come in all shapes and sizes but a family takes care of each other. *A Tale of Two Mommies*

relatable, as told from the perspective of the child of two moms and the questions his friends might have. Great flow and rhythm. A better conclusion would have made this book better, but still 5 stars overall.
